You will find my address on the cover so please submit material for the following columns:


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PERSONAL PROPERTY.

PRESIDENT'S CORNER




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TECH TALK

Since I was asked to write the Technical Article this month and am not exactly the best writer, I will hold my breath and here goes.....I chose to write about my experiences with the uses of Epoxy Glue as a finish base. Epoxy has come into its, own in the hobby field as in other fields. We are using this glue in many ways ranging from the complete building job to those panic cries at the field for "anyone have any glue?" for the quick get into the air again repair. It is also now being used for Pylon Cowls and Pants as well as fibre glass.

That all important supply list is as follows: Hobby Powy II, one four inch wide window squeegee, single edge razor blades and wet or dry sandpaper (180 and 320), also either Denatured Alcohol or Hobby Poxy thinner.

Start by mixing epoxy as described in the instructions. Mix about one inch per tube. After mixing thourghly pour one-half of this mixture onto the wing or surface to be coated. With the squegee, start spreading the epoxy out, working from the center of the wing to the tip. Use as much pressure as possible, as you want to squeeze out as much epoxy as possible from the wood. You are only trying to seal the wood not finish it at this time. After this is done set aside and let dry for 12 to 18 hours. Repeat the above process on the reverse side of the wing.

Now...the fun starts. Using either the razor blade or 180 sandpaper (I prefer the paper as it seems to take the epoxy down faster) lightly sand or scrape the surface being very careful not to break through to the wood. After this is finished clean the surface with a clean cloth.


Next mix another batch of Epoxy as in the fist step, but at this time I add a few drops of Thinner or Alcohol. Thinning the epoxy down allows it to flow more freely leaving a smooth finish. Take great care when adding thinner because too much may effect the drying time.

If you end up with any ripples or bumps, sand with 320 paper (wet) and use a block sander to feather out any edges. Sand entire wing lightly. Dope will not stick to any surface that

has not been sanded. I always cover wing with one coat of Silver Dope as a base. This will help get away from those light and dark spots on your finish, also cutting down on the amount of colored dope necessary.

Well...I hope this little bit of information will help anyone who has been putting off using epoxy. I have used it four times and found out something new every time but I like it and I'm sure you will too if you try it.
